

Are ChromeBooks the way of the future?

Late last year we brought you news about ChromeBooks being piloted in Manawatu. Now Bream Bay have been experimenting and Nancy Edge recently reported that it was possible to convert an old laptop into a ChromeBook.

The Chromebook is now a viable option as a replacement to a desktop, laptop, or even a tablet. The Chromebook comes in many formats from small touch screen devices to larger laptop and even desktop sizes. HAVE YOU CONSIDERED A CHROMEBOOK?

The marketing of Chromebooks by schools and retailers has created the notion that they are a "student's laptop" leading to the common misconception that they have limited functionality compared to a PC or MacBook.



While, to some degree, that is true, my research

led to the conclusion that the key differences are -

- **1.** A Chromebook cannot run applications that require a Windows or Apple based operating system to work e.g., software such as Adobe Photoshop and resident Accounting software.
- 2. Large hard drives are not required because data is automatically stored in the Cloud.

The good news is that Chromebooks can access online based software applications such as Office 365, Accounting, photo editing applications, etc., so they are not as limiting as we might imagine. And, best of all, they are less expensive.

All you need to sign into a Chromebook is a Google Account to access your stuff (data files). With that account you gain access to use all the <u>free Google applications</u> that they provide such as -

- Gmail (email)
- Google Docs (word processor)
- Google Sheets (spreadsheet)
- Google Slides (for making slideshows)
- Google Drive (cloud storage for your photos and files)
- Google Calendar (a digital calendar that connects to your phone or tablet)
- Contacts (an address book of family, friends and business you interact with).

The Google Operating System (OS) in a Chromebook is lightweight and designed to operate online. If you use the <u>Chrome browser</u> on your computer, you will discover that using a Chromebook is a similar experience.




They are the ideal laptop for seniors!

They are less complicated to use, easier to learn, simpler to set up, and perform most, if not all of the tasks the average older person could want. You can communicate by email, phone or video, write

letters, print documents, operate bank accounts, watch YouTube videos, store photos and documents, buy and sell items, access online services such as Office 365, Xero or MYOB, interact with Government departments and stream TV.

Older laptops can be re-purposed into Chromebooks.

In many cases, an older 64-bit laptop, with hardware that is unable to be upgraded, can be converted into a Chromebook. An operating system, based on the <u>Google Chromium OS</u> code base, called Cloud Ready has been developed by Neverware for this purpose.

How many older laptops are lurking about in family cupboards around the country that could be successfully re-purposed as Chromebooks to live another day for years to come?




Learning centres can convert laptops to Chromebooks.

At Bream Bay Learning Centre, we have converted four slow 6yr old Windows 10 HP laptops to Chromebooks. They now boot up faster and load websites at an acceptable speed.

Our objective is to promote them as -

- 1. an affordable alternative to PCs or MacBooks, both to our SeniorNet members and to the community at large,
- 2. the opportunity to repurpose a redundant PC or MacBook by converting to Chromebook.

In Conclusion: If you or someone you know has an older redundant laptop lurking around in the back of a dark cupboard somewhere, give some thought to saving it from the landfill by converting it to a perfectly usable Chromebook.

Internet Cookies:

When browsing the web, there's a high chance that you've come across a popup notification telling you that the website uses cookies. Many times, users go ahead and hit agree without fully knowing what they are signing up for. For all you know, you agree to **first-party or third-party cookies.**

Internet cookies aren't those artery-clogging goodness made by grandma. Instead, an internet cookie is a small piece of data from a particular website stored on a user's computer while they browse the web.

One of the common purposes of internet cookies is to track users as they browse through multiple websites and display them with personalized ads (based on their web searches, likes, and dislikes). Before further ado, My email is sent

let's get down to third-party cookies, how they collect user data, and their legal implications.

First-Party Cookies

First-party cookies are primarily used to improve how users interact with websites and are made by the host domain, which is the website you visited. These are accepted as an agreement between the user and the website to improve operations and are not controversial.

First-party cookies connect your browser to the website and exchange only the most fundamental data. There isn't much debate about their application. First-party cookies only save the data you provide on the website and maybe your IP address.

Are Third-Party Cookies Safe?

Cookies set by third parties aren't a big risk. Cookies aren't inherently dangerous, and they don't infect your computer with malicious viruses or malware. To some users, however, cookies may be considered an invasion of privacy.

To enable cookies in Google Chrome (Android):

- 1. On your Android device, **open** the Chrome app.
- 2. At the top right, tap **More** and then **Settings**.
- 3. Tap **Site Settings** and then **Cookies**.
- 4. Next to "Cookies," switch the setting on.
- 5. To allow third-party cookies, check the box next to "Allow third-party cookies."
